Wildlife Biologist: I study wildlife to understand what they need to thrive. I look at how birds, mammals, fish, reptiles, or amphibians depend on the forest and on each other. Why is this job important? Explain.



Wildland Firefighter: My job is to help protect and maintain the health of the forest by controlling and putting out wildfires. I also talk to the public about ways they can help prevent wildfires. Why is this job important? Explain.



Forester: Foresters, or forest managers, oversee forestlands. I develop plans for planting trees, monitoring trees for healthy growth, and making sure these activities follow environmental laws. Why is this job important? Explain.
